We are glad to work with the Little Sisters in fulfilling their mission and to reach out in a variety of practical ways to those around us, both at home and abroad.



Aim: To unite families with their community.

FAMILY – THE CREATIVE CONTAINER

FAMILY – THE CREATIVE CONTAINER is a parenting course with a strong therapeutic aspect facilitated by Ann-Marie Collins, teacher and art psychotherapist.

This course was offered and presented for the first time in Galway in September 2016 by Pernet Lay Associates. It was



The programme, based on issues which frequently arise for modern families, is structured to present seminal psycho-educational material on child-development and parenting topics. Carefully planned art-making and group activities are included to facilitate the digestion of the concepts presented and to help reflect on them in relation to the group members' particular family situations.

The course is shaped as it proceeds so as to be of maximum practical benefit to the particular participants' family lives.

The group met for two hours each Tuesday evening. Participants and facilitators were treated to tea and home-made treats before each session. This was a very valuable and appreciated part of the evening, allowing people

to relax and connect at the start of our sessions together.

The Process

At the outset of the course, some time was given to identifying the topics that participants were most eager to explore.





The topics then included in the course of the programme were:

- The role of Parents
- Building your relationship with your child
- Parenting through connection
- Identifying your child's needs
- Support and encouragement
- Establishing good routines
- Problem solving
- Tantrums
- Childhood anxiety
- Self-esteem
- Working with challenging behaviour
- Limits and Boundaries
- Engaging cooperation
- Food, Bedtime, Homework
- Sibling rivalry
- Emotional regulation, hyperactivity



The work was discussed and reviewed following each session by the facilitator and co-facilitators, Mary Horgan and Mary Cunningham. Participants completed an evaluation sheet at the end of each session and an evaluation sheet at the end of the course itself. Participants were asked to rate their satisfaction on a scale of I-5 each evening. 85% of the responses, which were completed by all the members, rated an average of 4-5 over the course of the programme.

The Samuel group was a six month journey of prayer, friendship, discussion and discernment. The programme is



designed for young people who have a decision in their lives to discern. Modern day life is busy full of many distractions which makes it hard to take the time to ponder these big life changing decisions. The monthly meetings with my spiritual director, Sr. Imelda, gave me the space to leave all of this at the door. It made me focus on my relationship with God, to realize his presence is real and constant in my life. He is my past, present and future. I got to explore new ways of prayer such as meditation. I discovered more about myself, my personality was motivated to take action. All of these aspects have helped me in the discerning process

The Samuel group also gave me the opportunity to spend time with my peers

both talking and praying as a group. Our leaders Sr. Carmel and Anne Marie provided our group with great kindness and hospitality every month. For each meeting there was a speaker who gave our group practical logical and different ways to discern.

Although the end is fast approaching, the skills that I have learned throughout this six month journey will stay with me. Our unique roads of life are full of twists, turns, bridges and junctions and the skill of discernment is an invaluable tool for this journey.



The Booklet "Survival Guide for Young Mothers" was written by three young mothers for young mothers, under the guidance of Aileen Davies and Deirdre O'Gorman Whyte. The aim of the booklet is to simplify how to deal


with an unplanned pregnancy at a young age. The girls describe their experiences of young motherhood and they hoped that through their sharing of these experiences new mothers will get through the first few months with their sanity and piggy bank relatively intact. Copies are available through Deirdre at the Community Training Workshop, Liosbaun. The booklet was first launched in the Westwood Hotel and later, at the invitation of Pernet, in the Westside Resource Centre and Bohermore Project.

We assist them in adjusting to life in Ireland in various small but important ways. We assist in preparing materials for applications for residency in Ireland. We assist in finding job placements for those who have got their papers.

Flags and Banners

Flags and Banners was set up in 1985, by Sr. Brigid Keane LSA to give employment to young travelers. Nellie

Casserly then took over the management of the Coop, which has since grown from strength to strength. The team was happy to be able to provide flags to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the Galway Roman Catholic cathedral including creating a flag for each of the parishes in the diocese.

GAA clubs are regular users of Flags and Banners when playing in the finals of the various football & hurling championships. Nellie offers a service where she couriers flags from Cork to Donegal. Her team also gets many requests for logos from hotels, golf clubs and festival organising committees and also in



support of other occasions such as the 25th anniversary of ordinations.





This is one of the many banners we produce. It's done in applique, which is hand done and machine stitched. Spleodar is an active student course with emphasis on the Irish language, a broad range of activities, art, craft, sport, music, drama, dance and much more.

Mahogony Tree - Fundraising Group

Aim: Pernet CLG has been set up and it has been granted charitable status and is registered with the Charities Regulatory Authority. It will engage in fundraising to support the running of the company and to provide Bursaries for attendance at workshops and courses.



The main fundraising activities during the year included (i) the Lotto, (ii) a concert (iii) Social Gathering (iv) the Golf Outing.

The Lotto, which commenced in Sept 2014, continued in October 2016 after renewal of the licence by the District Court. It is run by the same subcommittee of Frank Colohan, Oliver Geraghty, Conleth Cunnane and Sr. Imelda under the same protocols as last year. This year the possible



numbers were reduced from 32 to 28. This year we had one outright winner at €200; otherwise we have two Lucky Dips of €50 each per month. Our thanks are due to Ms Clodagh Gallagher, Solicitor, who voluntarily steers the

licence application through the District Court. A special thanks is due to Fr. Kevin Blade PP Ballinfoyle, who gives us the use of the Lotto machine and the community hall every month.


