


Pine Tree - Family Group

Aim: To unite families with their community.

FAMILY - THE CREATIVE CONTAINER

In the 2016/2017 annual report it was stated 'This family workshop was sponsored by the Little Sisters in 2016. We hope that to offer this course again in 2017, if we can source sufficient funding.'

Funding was secured for the above course from the Communities Integration Fund from the Department of Justice and Equality.

The parenting class 'Family - The Creative Container,' was delivered by Ann-Marie Collins, teacher and art psychotherapist. It is based on best practice in developmental psychology and parenting, and was delivered over 7 weekly two hour sessions.

The participants were parents of Irish, Albanian and mixed race children.

The program addressed issues which frequently arise for modern families.

Art based activities which are independent of language stimulated engagement from all participants.

Topics included:

- Parenting through connection
- Building your relationship with your child
- The role of parents
- Identifying your child's needs
- Support and encouragement
- Establishing good routines
- Problem solving
- Tantrums
- Childhood anxiety
- Self-Esteem
- Working with challenging behaviour
- Limits and boundaries







- Engaging cooperation
- Food, bedtime, homework
- Sibling rivalry
- Emotional regulation

The course emphasises building a connection with your child, teaching your child that incorrect behaviour has logical consequences and thus the concept of punishing a child is redundant and counterproductive.

The participants were asked to give course feedback, whilst many comments referred to insights to parenting skills, a few identified 'meeting Irish people,' to know Irish people, 'open discussion,' as highlights of the course.

Galway City Council Funding

We received a grant of €700 under the 'Social Inclusion Grant' scheme in 2017 from the Housing & Social Inclusion Department of Galway City Council. With this grant we ran a series of parenting classes targeting specific age groups, namely early to 5 years old, 6-11 years old and teenagers.

There were two sessions for each target group, in the first session Ann Marie sought input on the types of challenges that the parents were experiencing. She presented coping strategies, helpful parenting hints and techniques that addressed these challenges and more. Each parent received a handout which captured this information and she encouraged the parents to put these techniques in to action over the coming week. On the second night, the parents gave feedback on their experience of using the suggested strategies, hints and techniques and Ann Marie responded with guidance. The parents also gave feedback on the course.

An average of twenty parents comprising nationals, non-nationals and migrants attended the sessions. The teenager course was the most sought after and is the area of greatest need. We plan to run a number of these sessions in the 2018/2019 academic year if we secure funding for it.

We thank both organisations for helping Pernet CLG to reach out to a wide cohort of parents who otherwise could not access such professional, helpful parenting guidance.

Joshua Tree - Youth Group

Aim: To help the youth to find a spirituality, to create a safe space where "individual differences" are respected and to create an environment that fosters talents.

Thank you it was memorable and so inclusive. Congratulations.'







Willow Tree - Education Group

Aim: To give people hope and support through information and education – thereby encouraging empowerment.

Workshop on Coping with Situations of Grief and Loss.

In November we offered a one day workshop on Coping with Situations of Grief and Loss, facilitated by Gráinne O'Connell. This was our fourth time running this workshop. It was a time of very deep sharing and Gráinne also offered counsel and practical advice for those recently bereaved. She helped



English Language classes delivered at the Eglinton Hotel.

Many of the migrants in the direct provision centre in the Eglinton Hotel

Salthill have little or no English language skills. Through our other intercultural activities with the residents and in consultation with the manager, a group of 5 people were selected for intensive English classes given by an ACELS qualified TEFL teacher.

The classes were targeted at A1/A2 levels of the Common European Framework Reference for Languages (CEFR), the goal

was that they would acquire everyday/functional English with an emphasis on speaking.

After the first class, additional people requested to join the class, which resulted in people from Iran, Georgia, Bangladesh, Democratic Republic of Congo and Palestine attending.

The class provided a safe space where people were not self-conscious in speaking English, all were experiencing some level of difficulty and could empathise with each other. All participants reported that the classes helped them and requested more.







Redwood Tree - Spirituality Group

Aim: By walking in the footsteps of Jesus in guided meditation we discover Jesus' spirituality. He sided with the marginalized people of his time. The call is for us to journey with Jesus in our lives.

Celtic Spirituality

For many years, I have wanted to visit St. Brigid's well and attend the special Mass held in Liscannor on Feb 1st and this year I finally realized my wish. It was a bright, breezy

morning when we set out from Galway. We made our way to St. Brigid's Well where we saw all the prayer requests and mementos left by pilgrims at the well. People's faith in the power of prayer and especially the devotion to Brigid was palpable from the notes left by the visitors to the well. We filled our bottle with water from the blessed well and bought St. Brigid's crosses; the money generated from these sales is used to send good quality cattle to Africa.

After a quick cup of tea in the car, we made our way to Liscannor Church where a large crowd was gathering for the Mass. Fr. Denis Crosby was very welcoming and elicited the places people had travelled from for this special Mass. The school children had made rag dolls to represent St Brigid; the priest playfully pointed out that for the first time St Brigid was wearing ear rings. The dolls were beautiful and very colourful a harbinger of the colours that spring would bring. Fr. Denis recalled a funny story that his father told him about the tradition of the St. Brigid's doll, the













dolls were dressed in white and were brought from house to house, on entry to a house the occupants would pray and give an offering to St. Brigid; the dolls had a bag for such offerings. His father recalled an old rhyme that went

'Here's Bridgy all dressed in white,

Give her a shilling or she will give you a fright' A new born lamb was also welcomed by the congregation as a sign of spring. At the end of Mass Fr. Denis and his helpers gave a blessing to the sick or indeed anyone who wished to be blessed. It was lovely to see the old traditions being preserved and enthusiastically embraced by the young doll makers. I will go back again next year and bring a crowd.

Next February we will bring people from the Spirituality group to St. Bridgit's Well. Sr. Imelda O'Sullivan.

Birch Tree - Justice Group

Aim: We believe in the value and dignity of each individual and we seek justice for all whose opportunity for a full life is denied.

An invitation was issued to Pernet to attend an interfaith seminar Muslims, Christians and Interested Doubters —a different conversation in an Irish cultural context, organised by The Little Sisters of the Assumption. Three people from Pernet attended the seminar which was held in Dublin on 30 September 2017.



"Whether you are black, white, mixed race, Asian, Muslim, Catholic, Protestant, Christian, or a non believer, a skin colour of a person doesn't define them or their culture or backgrounds or what they believe in. The only thing that can define you is Love. That was my final conclusion", Jennifer Fri.

"The overall conclusion was that (rather than religion dividing) we needed to listen to each other, respect differences, and have those difficult conversations without holding prejudices that are unfounded or based on quick generalisations. As opposed to having "competing claims to God" we need to listen to the 'other'- the other is human. Rather than stereotyping people we need open truthful honest dialogue - embracing the difference of those people whom we often shut out". Jean MacSorley

Building connections through preparing and sharing meals together:

Funding was secured for the above course from the Communities Integration Fund from the Department of Justice and Equality.

A series of intercultural cookery demonstrations were held in the Westside Resource Centre in November 2017. Each evening started with a person from a given country demonstrating how to cook two dishes from his/her native country. Five cuisines were demonstrated over the programme, Polish, Filipino, South African, Indian and Irish.

All attendees were encouraged to peer into the pots, ask questions about ingredients, identify possible substitute ingredients where required, ask about cooking methods, nutritional values and health benefits. Volunteers assisted in bridging linguistic and cultural gaps that were apparent during the demonstration.

The meal was then served to the attendees who were seated around a big table, this encouraged interaction between all. Many of the attendees participated in all of the evenings but there were new attendees at every evening. The minimum number of countries represented at a single event was 5 with 9 participating on the Filipino night, for example Filipino, Polish, Syrian, Iranian, Albanian, Palestinian, South African, Tanzanian and Somalian.


Initially attendees were shy and did not ask questions but as the cookery demonstration progressed, the heat generated by the cookery and the delicious aromas of same permeated the atmosphere, the ambience changed from a room full of reserved strangers to a chattering, laughing bunch of people sharing a universal experience of food preparation and all that goes along with it. By the wash up time, we were tripping over each other trying to help in the clean-up.All attendees reported that they really enjoyed the evenings and it helped them to identify shared experiences centred on food and its preparation.



Sharing our lived experience through Art

Through the medium of art Pernet worked with a group of people from varying backgrounds and nationalities - some from the Eglinton Hotel Direct Provision Centre Salthill, Western Centre Galway and various other parts of Galway city. Over a period of initially 3 workshops we provided a space wherein connections were built up between asylum seekers, migrants and nationals using the non-formal method of plaster mask making as a means of exploring the different

aspects of their culture and traditions. Fifteen participants from the aforementioned locations portrayed aspects of their culture using the process of mask making. They came from a diverse range of countries Palestine, Poland, Tanzania, Syria, Bangladesh, Philippines, Ireland, Somalia, Malawi, Albania and Iran. Through visual representation they incorporated symbolism, from their lived experiences, into their masks that crossed the language barrier. One Syrian lady expressed her pain and suffering very powerfully without having to tell her story in words. She painted waves on the forehead area of her mask then incorporated a young girl clutching her teddy bear. Tears flowed from the eyes of her mask with hearts placed in the pupils of the eyes. The masks were displayed at the social gathering where they inspired much admiration and discussion.

Ash Tree - Enterprise Group:

Aim: Networking, Mentoring/Support and Training in Enterprise.

Flags and Banners

The Fairgreen Training Centre was established by Sister Bridget in 1976; the goal was to provide education to Traveller girls. The Fairgreen training centre produced flags and banners and became known as such. In 1984 Galway Corporation approached Flags and Banners to produce banners for the Galway Quincentennial year. It subsequently became a thriving business producing flags, banners, bunting, and family crest wall hangings for the western region. The business subsequently transitioned to private ownership. However Pernet and Flags and Banners continue their close association by mutually supporting each other, with Flags and Banners producing bespoke flags for Pernet's social gathering and participating in the annual golf scramble.

This year the LSA has supported our efforts to assist migrants to start their own cottage enterprise by funding the purchase of a sewing machine and supplies for needle point.

One of the migrants received Irish naturalisation from the Department of Justice and Equality. This motivated her to seek training in leisure pursuits. In order to complete her qualification she needed to find supervised placement in a leisure centre. Pernet helped her to get a place in Kingfisher Leisure Centre in Galway. I continued to be in a supportive capacity after her graduation.













Mahogony Tree - Fundraising Group

Aim: Pernet CLG has been set up and it has been granted charitable status and is registered with the Charities Regulatory Authority. It will engage in fundraising to support the running of the company and to provide Bursaries for attendance at workshops and courses.



The main fundraising activities during the year included (i) the Lotto, (ii) grants from the Communities Integration Fund from the Department of Justice and Equality, (iii) Grants from Galway City Council Social Inclusion Grant scheme in 2017, (iv) Grant from the LSA, (v) the Golf Outing , (vi) Lucky Dip at the Social Gathering.

Our thanks are due to Ms Clodagh Gallagher, Solicitor, who voluntarily steered the licence application through the District Court so the Lotto continues through 2018. It is run by the same subcommittee of Frank Colohan, Oliver Geraghty, Conleth Cunnane and Sr. Imelda under the same protocols as last year. This year the possible numbers are 28. The Lotto has moved to Ballinfoyle Castlegar Neighbourhood Centre and occurs in the last week of the month. This year we have two Lucky Dips of €50 each per month.

Food was provided by local Polish, Filipino and Irish providers.



Through these contacts great friendships were formed, which resulted in him inviting Irish musicians to play with him at an intercultural music event with people who are currently refugees and come from many different countries.

I am grateful to Pernet for the intercultural experiences that I have experienced while taking part in the practice sessions and the concert as part of the Pernet Intercultural Choir. I met many great people from many cultures and shared great experiences with them. I feel that my new Moroccan friend has been given an opportunity to integrate with Irish people and he has responded by providing Irish people hospitality and an opportunity to meet many people from the refugee centre.

Well done to you Imelda and to Pernet, I am grateful for this experience, keep up the great work.
